



Director's Report on Developmental Progress Assessment

Overview:

Tariq visited our center for a developmental progress assessment. The child has shown improvement on the first intervention protocols. Current findings indicate information processing delays and cognitive developmental delays caused by genetic variants affecting development. These factors contribute to features of autism; however, according to precision health analysis, Tariq does not meet criteria for an autism diagnosis. The child requires ongoing observation and further analyses to support developmental progress.

Recommended Plan:

- 1. Development Protocol for Information Processing**
 - Continue protocol for 4 months, followed by reassessment (preferably in person).
 - Reevaluate baseline after reassessment.
 - Maintain ongoing intervention plan.

- 2. Main Recommended Analyses (through Neurazon, Canada)**

To be repeated every year
