Director's Report on Developmental Progress Assessment

Overview:

Shaima was evaluated at our center and presents with signs of **global developmental delays** and **information processing difficulties**, which have contributed to features consistent with **intellectual developmental delays**. Previous febrile seizures epiosdes depsite negative EEG were seen indicating potential absent seizures that should be followed by a neurologist.

Previous MRI scans have confirmed the presence of white matter delays, supporting the clinical findings. Notably, there is a sibling with a similar phenotype and progression, which may indicate a familial or genetic predisposition.

This evaluation is part of a broader strategy to understand and support Shaima's cognitive and neurological development. Despite the current delays, Shaima remains **capable of improvement** with a structured intervention plan.

Recommended Plan:

1. Development Protocol for Information Processing

- Initiate an individualized information processing development protocol.
- Monitor the child's progress over a **4-month period**.
- Reevaluate in person if possible to adjust and tailor the plan based on observed outcomes
- Establish a developmental **baseline** for comparison in follow-up assessments.

Recommended Tests through Neurazon (Canada):

Note: These tests are recommended based on Neurazon research guidelines. They are **external**, optional, and not conducted through our center directly. Parents are encouraged to follow them for more insights. These analyses are not done at EICADD.

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Recommended Therapy:

- Neuroplasticity Rehabilitation Therapy is advised in later stages as the child stabilizes. It is not yet indicated at this point.
- Continued monitoring and therapy adjustments based on progress are necessary.

Conclusion:

This is not a definitive diagnosis but rather a developmental evaluation based on current observations. Shaima's condition is dynamic and subject to improvement. The presence of a sibling with similar findings suggests the importance of continued testing and personalized therapy. We encourage the family to follow the recommendations and reassess regularly.
